 This year's route travels through and past many historic sites involving the Civil War, the C&O Canal, and Fort Frederick. Interpretive stops will be featured along the bike route. The FNB/CAM-TOUR is a fully supported ride with meals, full service rest stops, medical, massage therapy, mechanical, SAG, and entertainment provided each day. The FNB/CAM-TOUR is open to all cyclists. Riders average 55 miles per day with optional longer routes offered including a 100 mile "Century Day" route during mid-week. Cyclists ride at their own pace along a well marked route. Water stops are provided every 10 miles and food stops every 20 miles. Annual "merry-making" events, now a FNB/CAM-TOUR tradition, include a helmet decorating contest, a Talent Night and the awarding of Century patches, a badge of honor among long distance cyclists. The popularity of this cycling vacation grows each year, with last year's ride attracting 1,640 cyclists from ages 9 to 78 representing 31 states and three foreign countries. Registration is limited to 1,800 riders this year. Registration is \$175 with a discount for early registration. An optional meal plan is offered.

For people who are new to multi-day bike tours, Cycle Across Maryland will hold a Bike Rally on April 22 in Howard County to answer all questions about the tour and lead group training rides. Information about the Bike Rally is included in the TOUR application package.

Cycle Across Maryland is a not-for-profit corporation. Its mission is to promote healthy, noncompetitive recreational sports, education and safety. A Terra Alta, W.Va., man was charged with DWI by Tfc. M.E. Rodeheaver Saturday evening after he was initially detained for an equipment violation.

Ronald R. Sisler II, 18, was subsequently charged with the offense after the trooper pulled him to the side of the road along Rt. 135 for the unrelated traffic stop. During the stop, Sisler's vehicle reportedly rolled forward and struck Rodeheaver's cruiser, causing
